

BIRDWATCHING AROUND KALBARRI

The Murchison River, running through the coastal sandplain to Kalbarri, provides a wide range of habitat that includes eucalypt woodland, river flats, mallee heathland, deep river pools and a broad estuary. With beaches and reefs, they support about 200 bird species.

The park heathlands are noted for their wildflowers. Banksias, grevillias, hibiscus and verticordia provide blooms of every colour. Honeyeaters feature predominantly among the bush birds in the heath. Black and Pied Honeyeater which are resident and breed in the park are especially active in the spring when the emu-bushes, *Eremophila*, are in flower.

The Estuary

Visit the estuary to see the Eastern Osprey. There will also be many other birds present, including gulls, terns, cormorants, pelicans. You may also see the White-bellied Sea-eagle flying above the water.

Kalbarri to Red Bluff

This road crosses Wittecarra Creek which, after rain, has a flood area where ducks, grebes and waders breed. Spend some time along the creek near Red Bluff Caravan Park where you should see and hear a Southern Scrub-robin.

Red Bluff to old airstrip

Along the road can be seen Splendid, White-winged and Variegated Fairy-wren and Redthroat. Chats are common in this area. At the disused gravel pit, honeyeaters and Rock Parrot can be seen.

The River Tracks


These follow the river upstream and can be rough at times. The area has a large variety of birds: ducks, raptors and both butcherbirds can be present. Look out for doves, parrots, cockatoos and cuckoos.

Meanarra Hill

On an early morning visit there are magnificent views of the area, which can provide whistlers, thornbills, Redthroat, fairy-wrens and honeyeaters.

The River Gorges

Look out for Australian Bustard and Emu along the



road. The scenery at all four gorges is spectacular. Fairy Martin nest in the cliff sides and raptors are abundant, with Peregrine Falcon at Hawkes Head. Both Pied and Black Honeyeater have been seen at the Loop and Z Bend. If you are reasonably fit, take your lunch and spend a pleasant day walking around the Loop. Fan-tailed, Black-eared, Horsfield's and Shining Bronze Cuckoo are all present with their host species. Carnaby's Black-Cockatoo may be seen.

Murchison River Bridge

Excellent birding country exists between the bridge and 10 Mile Pool. Camping is allowed with good tracks on both sides of the river. In the larger pools are Blue-billed Duck, Australian Shelduck and Hardhead. Diamond and Peaceful Dove are numerous, also Common Bronzewing, and in the drier areas Splendid and Blue-breasted Fairy-wren.

At least 80 species are here for the ticking!
